HITTING THE ROAD

Caddington Grove's Dementia Friends have been on tour this year, educating members of the community about the condition.

As committed Dementia Friends, our job is to go out into the local area and run information sessions so people can learn more about how to support people living with dementia.

During one of the stops on our tour, we met with Year 11 students at Dunstable's Priory Academy, who are studying Health and Social Care. For their teacher Pauline Carey, the visit was an excellent opportunity to give the students the tools to become Dementia Friends too.

"Dementia is one of those diseases that touches many lives," says Pauline. "I think it's important to try to create a community that is more understanding of the difficulties experienced by people living with dementia. Where better to start that process than with our young people?"

WALK TO REMEMBER

Team Caddington joined hundreds of people to take part in a 5K Memory Walk at Willen Lake, Milton Keynes on Sunday 22nd September.

Each year, the Alzheimer's Society asks people all over the country to complete Memory Walks to fundraise and increase awareness for people living with dementia.

"The Memory Walk was brilliant, there was a great atmosphere and it was fun for all the family," says Admissions Lead Helen Duggan. "So far, we've raised around £500 for the Alzheimer's Society this year, and we hope to increase that total before 2020.

The Alzheimer's Society raises money to progress the research into dementia, to encourage innovation in care and ultimately find a cure.



At Caddington Grove, we are always looking for ways to improve our residents' wellbeing – so the arrival of a 'Magic Table' in the summer was cause for great excitement.

Designed by health tech pioneers OMI, the Mobii interactive projector can be used on tables or floors to help stimulate people living with dementia. Wellbeing & Lifestyle Coach Amy Humphries has been using the table alongside residents and says it's had an immediate positive impact.

"The Magic Table promotes wellbeing by creating an opportunity for residents to be active, to stimulate their senses and to get them socialising," explains Amy. "You can see their confidence building as they play the games, many of which are designed to spark memories and get them moving. We've also found that, since using the table, our residents see improvements in their mobility and balance when playing the games."

One of the unique features of the Mobii table is the ability to customise it. For Amy, that presented an opportunity to use pictures and songs that mean something to the people she is working with.

"I've edited the games to personalise them by adding pictures of the residents for them to paint, alongside their favourite song, which plays along in the background during the activity," says Amy. "We've also included pictures from the local area and created

a game where the residents have to move flowers to reveal those familiar images."

Although the Magic Table is used with residents daily, it's also available for local people living with dementia for use during dementia support group sessions. Witnessing the impact on the wellbeing of the people who regularly use the interactive table has been incredibly moving for Amy.



"We put on the aquarium for our resident Barbra and asked, 'What can you see?'," shares Amy. "She said, 'I can see flowers, water, fishes, rocks, plants growing in the water, fishes running about looking for food.' She started moving her hands over the water and said, 'This is marvellous, isn't it?'"

Come and use our Magic Table

Our dementia support group was launched in September and the first session was attended by Dunstable Mayor Sid Abbott. Every Monday between 10:30-11:30am members of the local community who are living with dementia can come to take part in sessions that include a variety of activities, including using the Magic Table.
